



Your Money in Action: Steps Toward Financial Stability

A greater grasp of financial capability can mean intentional goal setting, leading to a strong financial foundation for the future. SNHS offers Your Money In Action, a unique financial program that covers financial goal setting, budgeting, saving, debt resolution, improving credit scores and banking. The three-part course, delivered by Family Resource Specialists, is offered both in person and in group settings to fit your schedule. Hands on, and real time, opportunities allow participants the opportunity to put into practice what they've learned and to begin to apply the principles in their everyday lives.



This financial program saved me!

I am a mother of three and a wife. Last year my husband broke both of his legs and hasn't been able to work, leaving all the financial burden on me alone. I was almost at my breaking point when SNHS reached back out to me. I was struggling to stay afloat and having this help made a huge difference in my life. VOLUNTEER INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE (VITA)

The 46 year old program, first introduced by the Gerald R. Ford Administration in 1976, aims at securing Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) dollars for eligible taxpayers. Since preparing the first tax return in 2007 our VITA program has put over \$10 million in the pockets of our participating clients. The VITA program, along with our Your Money in Action program, allows for clients to build a solid foundation for financial stability.

ASSURANCE 16 FUNDS

Allows SNHS staff to provide services that encourage and enable households to reduce their home energy needs, as well as to offer an increased education in budgeting that help to leverage the Fuel Assistance benefits received.

In FY22 **496** households received support through Assurance 16 with a value of \$198.383.99.





DID YOU KNOW?

The Child Tax Credit (CTC) is a tax benefit that helps families with the costs of raising children. While the CTC has existed for over two decades, it was significantly expanded in 2021.

This year, you can get up to \$3,600 per child under six and \$3,000 per child ages 6-17. To get the Child Tax Credit (CTC) you have to file a tax return. To file a tax return for just the CTC you can use https://www.getctc.org/. To file a full tax return to claim the CTC and all other tax benefits you are eligible for you can use https://www.getyourrefund.org/.

Whether or not you received monthly CTC payments last





year, and whether or not you filed taxes in the last few years or at all, filing a tax return this year is the right next step to get your CTC payments.

SNHS Nutrition Programs Promoting Nutritional Health Today for a Stronger Tomorrow

SNHS is committed to providing nutritious food for individuals and families who find themselves facing financial hardship.

The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) provides emergency food assistance at no cost to low-income families.

The Women, Infants and Children (WIC) Program provides nutritious foods, education, referrals and breastfeeding support to income eligible pregnant and post-partum women, infants and children under the age of 5. All of our nutritionists have at least a four year Bachelors in Science and Nutrition to support our families.

The Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)
provides food resources to income eligible adults over the age

of 60. SNHS has CSFP sites all throughout both Rockingham and Hillsborough Counties.

Multiple **food pantry** sites located in Rockingham County provide access to nutritional food as well as easy access to our other supportive programs. These food pantries are open at no cost to community members that need additional food resources.

Gardening Plots, Community and Nutritional Veggies

The Community Gardens program is an initiative of SNHS and Hillsborough County to provide garden plots on county land located in Goffstown to interested individuals. Income eligible Hillsborough County residents are given priority to available plots and are provided a plot---free of charge! Benefits of the program include greater access to fresh fruits and vegetables, lower grocery bills, and an increased sense of community. Deadline to apply for your plot is April 15.



Funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Section 202 Supportive Housing Program, Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC), and New Hampshire Housing has enabled us to build and manage 29 elderly housing facilities which represent 894 apartments. The residents of these units pay 30% of their income for rent with the balance subsidized under HUD's Section 8 Rental Assistance Program. Heat and utilities are included in the rent. A Proclamation

In the year of our Lord Two Thousand and Twenty Two

COMMUNITY ACTION MONTH MAY 2022

WHEREAS, Community Action emerged from the heart of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 and America's commitment to "eradicate poverty among its people"; and

WHEREAS, Community Action builds and promotes economic stability as an essential aspect of enhancing strong communities; and

WHEREAS, Community Action remains engaged, adaptive and responsive to emergent community needs, including housing stability provided to thousands of New Hampshire households during the COVID 19 pandemic through their work with the Emergency Program; and

WHEREAS, Community Action has enhanced the lives of tens of thousands of people across New Hampshire by providing essential, life-changing services and opportunities such as workforce training and development, senior housing, public transportation, quality childcare and development including Head Start, food and nutrition services, economic and community development, energy assistance, and energy conservation; and

WHEREAS, Community Action has put a human face on poverty in New Hampshire for 57 years by advocating for limited-income citizens without a voice, so that they move toward greater self-sufficiency, replacing despair with opportunity; and

WHEREAS, Community Action will continue to implement innovative and cost effective programs for those most vulnerable within New Hampshire;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, CHRISTOPHER T. SUNUNU, GOVERNOR of the State of New Hampshire, do hereby proclaim MAY 2022 as COMMUNITY ACTION MONTH in the State of New Hampshire, and call this to the attention of all citizens.

The NH Emergency Rental Assistance Program (NHERAP)

provided millions of dollars of financial assistance to thousands of NH renters who could not pay their rent and/ or utilities during the pandemic. The program worked with tenants, landlords and utilities to help keep NH residents safely housed. SNHS is proud to have been part of the Governor's Office for Emergency Relief and Recovery's (GOFERR) plan to support NH residents in this way. Since 1965 Fuel Assistance has been providing heating and electrical assistance to households facing financial challenges. This past year, full of so many unexpected challenges many of our neighbors found the support that they needed at one of our many Resource Centers. The program is funded by grants from the federal government, and makes payments that go directly to local utilities and vendors. To be eligible, an individual's income level must not be more than 150% of the federal poverty level. The payment amount is determined according to the size and type of home, as well as type of fuel.

WIOA is proud to shine the spotlight on Talita Santiago, a 32-year-old single parent with 2 children. She speaks Portuguese as her first language and has never been to ESOL class. Instead, Talita states that she just practices her English language skills every chance she gets! Talita is attending St. Joseph's School of Nursing for Medical Assisting and is an excellent example of someone working their way up the career ladder, as she is already an LNA, plans to work next as a Medical Assistant, and

eventually, become a Registered Nurse, her dream

Talita is finding the training for Medical Assistant at St. Joseph's very intense but is doing well with positive comments from her instructor. Financially, she was recently struggling as her public assistance was stopped. With the assistance of the Career Navigator, she was able to get in all required documentation and should have her benefits restored in the next few days. While her benefits

were stopped, she was unable to pay for childcare, so had to limit her work hours, as well. WIOA is trying to see if her arrears can be paid, so that her childcare can be restored.

Talita is grateful for this opportunity and recently sent the following email to her Career Navigator:

"Now I am looking forward to step by step have my goal of becoming a registered nurse realized. And that is because of you! Thank you for all that!"

As the world continued to open and routines took on familiar patterns, our Workforce Programs ramped up as well.

Our Workforce Programs supported our clients on their path to meeting their goals.

Umuhoza, a native of Burundi, lived in a refugee camp for 10 years with her family before arriving in the U.S. with her family in October 2022. Umuhoza enrolled in the LNA for Success program, a partnership between the WIOA Adult Program at Southern NH Services, International Institute of New England, and Manchester Community College. After

receiving her state LNA license, Umuhoza continues to work as a home health aide and has also picked up a second job working in the Neuro/orthopedic surgery unit at Southern New Hampshire Health. Having received her official LNA hospital badge, Umuhoza has begun taking the next steps to receive her high school equivalency credential having been only 1 year away from graduating in her home country. After receiving her degree, Umuhoza plans to pursue a career as a nurse.



Congratulations to Billie Owens who is the first graduate of T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood New Hampshire, a program of Southern New Hampshire Services! Billie currently works at M & C Children's Learning Place in Candia, NH. Billie graduated from New Hampshire Technical Institute in May 2023 with her Associates Degree in Early Childhood Education.

T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood® New Hampshire provides comprehensive scholarships to enable early

educators to take coursework leading to credentials and degrees by making it possible for them to afford both the time and expense of going to school.

Recipients enroll in courses at local colleges while working at least 30 hours per week. In exchange for receiving increased compensation. Recipients also agree to remain at the sponsoring program for 6 months to 1 year following the completion of their scholarship contract.



A Place to Call Home

Creating Hope Out of Issues Related to Homelessness

For years, SNHS has played a significant role in the lives of men and women living in Manchester and Nashua who are experiencing barriers to finding a place to call home. Residents are connected with supportive programming, as well as to community partners, that can enable them to move toward increased quality of life.

Robinson House (24 units for men-Manchester) and Mary's House (40 units for women-Nashua) consist of rehabilitated Section 8 rent assisted apartments for homeless individuals who need safe and affordable housing to reach their personal goals.

The Homeless Housing and Access Revolving Loan Fund

Provides guarantees of rental security deposits and/or first month's rent to eligible persons.

First and foremost, I'm in tears. Thank you so much as a single mother of 3 boys the youngest being just 1 years old, it's been a rough few months. I have always worked hard to provide for my children but this last year has been very challenging. Plenty of nights I cried in the shower not knowing what I was going to do. I just knew I had to keep going and showing up. I'm so grateful for my landlord for working with me. I'm also grateful for this program that has given me an opportunity to get fully back on my feet and hopefully stay in a position where I can maintain my finances. I appreciate this more that you know and now I can focus on one of my sons who has been having some serious health issue. God bless." - **NEHRAP Client**

Health issues related to diabetes created a barrier to working for Gary, which lead to his car becoming his home. Eight months after giving up drinking and prescription drugs, Gary had applied for housing but the wait list was long and he had just about given up hope. While attending an AA meeting, the participant sitting beside Gary called him aside and spoke of Robinson House.

Robinson House, explained Gary's neighbor, could provide a safe place to live as well as staff that was available to help connect with other supports that Gary might need. Since moving from his car, Gary's health is getting better and he has started working part-time and saving with the hopes of eventually moving into a 2-bedroom apartment.

When you live paycheck to paycheck small things like food and gas increases can have a huge negative impact on your budget.
