Message from our Chief Executive Officer: Donnalee Lozeau

This year as we celebrate our 60th anniversary (or birthday) this calendar is meant to give you a peek of "then" and "now."

From the vision of President Kennedy to the action of President Johnson – On August 20, 1964 in the Rose Garden at the White House and 72 different pens later, President Johnson signed into law the Economic Opportunity Act.

"To mobilize the human and financial resources of the Nation to combat poverty in the United States. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that this Act may be cited as the "Economic Opportunity Act of 1964."

In October of 1964, President Johnson appointed Sargent Shriver as the first Director of this new Federal Agency.

This act created Community Action Agencies (CAA) – and all 50 states responded. They were designated by geographical locations and could be private non-profits or public non-profits.

A Voice and a Vote- one of the most unique aspects of Community Action is the make-up of the Board of Directors. Federal mandates require a board that must include people of low income – those who are the beneficiaries of the programs. This resulted in a Tri-partite board. A minimum of a third of the board must be people of low-income – a third must be elected officials or their named representative and the remaining members from the private sector.

Our agency was officially chartered as The Community Action Committee for Hillsborough County a private non-profit in the State to serve as the CAA serving the City of Nashua and the 29 (twenty-nine) Hillsborough County towns.

In 1969 Manchester became part of our agency and we became a unified Community Action Program for all of Hillsborough County soon to be named:

Southern NH Services, Inc.

At that time, New Hampshire had 6 (six) Community Action Agencies along with a State Association.

In 2011 Rockingham Community Action merged with Southern NH Services and today, there are 5 (five) agencies.

In October of 2024 we again changed our name, this time to reflect our partnership with over a thousand Community Action Agencies nationwide!

While we have grown significantly over these 60 (sixty) years our goal remains the same, serving those of low-income and helping them to achieve economic independence.

Across our two counties we have resource centers and field offices along with child care and Head Start centers. Last year we shared with you the innovative programs that have been developed including the Parent Leadership Training Institute (PLTI), among other resources and activities we are leading and contributing to in our communities.

2024 was just as exciting as we opened our first "Opportunity" Center in Manchester. This location, at 130 Silver Street, is next door to our administrative offices and across the street from our child development center, in a very welcoming space. This center really changes the way our clients see how we approach our service to them, and provides space for families, a learning/play area for children and easy access to tools they need. These tools include computers, printers, copiers, and scanning and faxing capabilities. It is a joy to see the faces of those we serve as they realize this space if for **them**!

Our hope is to renovate our other resource centers into "opportunity" centers as well. Recently we received funding through the State American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to begin this type of work at our Derry resource center, thanks to the support of Executive Councilor Janet Stevens.

From enhanced programming to new facilities and a new way to deliver services, the change, though a good thing, comes with effort. I want to thank the staff of CAPHR for their ongoing dedication and cooperation as we refurbish, refresh and rethink how we deliver resources to those in need in the most respectful and useful manner possible as has been the case for the last 60 years!

For sixty (60) years we have been able to count on our staff, our funders and our partners to deliver services in a comprehensive life changing way for those we serve.

Along with our board of directors and our Executive team, I remain grateful to be part of something that has made such a remarkable impact across the nation and here at home for six (6) decades and counting!

On August 20, 1964 in an outdoor ceremony at the White House President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the Economic Opportunity Act into law. Community Action was among the many programs that were created.

In May of 1965 our charter was in place and we served the City of Nashua and the 29 surrounding towns and we were known as:

The Community Action Agency for Hillsborough County

In 1971 we added the City of Manchester to our service area and in 1974 we renamed ourselves:

Southern NH Services, Inc. (SNHS)

In 2011 Rockingham Community Action merged with SNHS.

In 2024 we changed our name to:

Community Action Partnership Hillsborough and Rockingham Counties (CAPHR)

Child Care

In March of 1985 Hillsborough Child Care on School Street in the town of Hillsborough received its license to provide child care. This center in addition to housing Head Start provided child care serving just over fifty (50) children. Services were provided on a sliding fee scale for hourly care ranging from sixty (60) cents to one dollar and twenty cents (\$1.20) per hour.

In 1993, the agency moved our location from the Hillsborough County Farm Complex in Goffstown to 40 Pine Street in Manchester. That move gave the perfect opportunity to move our Head Start classrooms out of church basements to under one roof in classrooms with large windows. It also provided the opportunity for full-day/full-year state subsidized child care spaces. Nashua followed soon after with our first rental space on Spruce Street to permanent owned space on Allds Street.



For parents in need of child care during the work week, we are able to offer full-day and extended-day child care for infants, toddlers, and preschool children. These programs provide nutritious breakfasts, lunches, and snacks while also working with families to address the special health and

nutritional needs of each child.

To help ensure affordable child care is available to families of low income, we accept the New Hampshire Child Care Development Fund Scholarship (CCDF).





Since 2007, CAPHR has provided Child Care Resource & Referral (CCR&R) services, licensed as Child Care Aware® of New Hampshire, to educate and support families, providers, and the community regarding child care needs.

We help administer and maintain a free and confidential referral database of child care providers to connect families in need with available and qualified child care.

Nutrition Programs

COMMODITY SUPPLEMENTAL FOOD PROGRAM (CSFP)

In 1969 the U.S. Department of Agriculture began the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP). It was the nation's first

federal food supplementation effort for those of low-income providing monthly food packages, designed to provide protein, calcium, iron, and vitamins A and C. This program was implemented for mothers, infants, and children. In 1983 the government included seniors 60 years and older to the list of eligible participants.

Although Community Action staff volunteered to distribute what was then often referred to as the "free cheese" program, it did not become a program of Southern NH Services until 1991.

The food packages in 1991 consisted of shelf-stable milk, peanut butter, pasta, cereal, canned fruits and vegetables, canned meat, and fresh cheese.

Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)

In 1972, WIC was piloted as a supplemental food program by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) aimed at improving the health of pregnant mothers, infants, and children in response to growing concern over malnutrition among mothers


and young children of low and very low income.

By 1975 it was established as a permanent program by legislation, and eligibility was extended to non-breastfeeding women (up to 6 months postpartum) and children up to age 5.

In 1978 the WIC program became a part of Southern New Hampshire Services.



The CSFP program today allows seniors to pick up pre-packaged boxes once a month from various Resource Centers across southern New Hampshire, including Manchester and Nashua, satellite sites, or housing delivery drop-sites at participating communities. The food packages include a variety of items such as canned meats, fruits, vegetables, bottled fruit juices, non-fat powdered milk, cereals, pasta, rice, dehydrated potatoes, peanut butter, cheese, and other available foods. Additionally, the Fresh Fruits and Vegetables

Program enhances CSFP nutrition with fresh produce like lettuce, carrots, tomatoes, potatoes, peppers, bananas, apples, and pumpkins, sourced from The New Hampshire Food Bank and local donations. Housing drop-sites are exclusively available to residents at all Senior Housing campuses and additional complexes in Manchester and Nashua.

WIC

The WIC program offers comprehensive support for mothers and young children. Professional nutritionists provide personalized guidance and individualized

plans to address children's eating habits. Nutritious food packages include fresh, frozen, and canned fruits and vegetables, whole grains, and infant foods, including formula if needed. Prenatal nutrition education ensures babies receive essential nutrients for development, while breastfeeding promotion and support offer resources for optimal infant nutrition.

Additionally, WIC provides nutrition education, health

Additionally, WIC provides nutrition education, health care referral assistance, and health screenings to foster continued good health and development.

In October 1980, the Greenville Falls elderly housing opened, transforming two former textile mill buildings into seventy (70) units of housing. This project was funded by a HUD Section 202 grant.

Michael O'Shea created and managed the CAPHR Management

Corporation, which provided property and agency management services. He played a pivotal role in the senior housing program initiated in 1980. By the time of Michael O'Shea's retirement in 2016, the



SNHS Management Corporation managed nearly 1,000 units for the senior community in New Hampshire.

In recognition of Michael O'Shea's dedication to Community Action and senior housing and with a nod to his faith and his Irish heritage, in 2025 our Hallsville Senior Housing on Hayward Street in Manchester, which was formerly Our

Lady of Perpetual Help Parish, will be renamed in his honor to O'Shea Flats.



SNHS Management Corporation is one of the leading providers of housing to income and age-eligible applicants. We manage 29 elderly housing sites from Pittsburg to Greenville and Bristol to N. Berwick, ME, that include 910 units, currently with 951 residents choosing their homes with us. Our funding is provided by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban **Development (HUD) and area housing authorities**

May 1965: CAPHR is chartered by the State of New Hampshire as the Community Action Agency for Hillsborough County serving the City of Nashua and the twenty-nine surrounding towns. Six other Community Action

agencies are also designated in

the state.

1968: The Community Action Agency for Hillsborough County becomes the Community Action Agency for the city of Manchester as well.

1971: The Community Action Agency for Hillsborough County is renamed Southern **New Hampshire Services** (CAPHR).

2011: Southern New Hampshire Services becomes the Community **Action Agency for** Rockingham County.



Summer Food Service Program

The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) ensures that at-risk children and teens have access to healthy meals and snacks during the summer months when school is not in session. During the school year, 22 million children receive free or reduced lunches. SFSP was designed to fill these children's gaps during the summer months. Sponsored by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), beginning in 1978, the Summer Food Service Program provides breakfast, lunches, and snacks in safe, supervised areas such as parks, pools, and recreation centers for any child 18 years of age or younger that comes to the location.

In 1985 we began operating the Hillsborough County Summer Food Program. We prepared lunches daily and delivered them to Manchester, Nashua, and towns in Hillsborough County. As the nutritional needs of youth became increasingly evident, breakfasts were added to the program in 1995.

In 1998 breakfasts, lunches, and snacks were served.

CAPHR has been a doorway to this program in communities within Hillsborough, Rockingham, Strafford, Merrimack, and Carroll Counties. Over the years, our sister Community Action Agencies have assumed the operations in their areas, with additional collaborative partners in an effort to provide nutrition to our youth most in need. This program is still in operation today and had its greatest

impact when the COVID pandemic hit and families were struggling in unprecedented ways.

Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP)

WAP was born out of the 1973 oil crisis when unemployment and energy prices were exceptionally high. Energy conservation measures emerged as one of the nation's top priorities. In 1976, Congress passed the Energy Conservation Policy Act and WAP became an official program.

The first decade of WAP saw weatherization crews focus on the fundamentals of air sealing, installing insulation, and caulking.

As the program expanded its services through the 1980s and 1990s, so did its understanding of building science and the home as an entire system. New testing technologies such as infrared cameras, pressure diagnostics, and blower doors, allowed auditors to see into homes in a new way.

In 2024, we served 310 households in Hillsborough and 238 in Rockingham with weatherization services. Our team is adapting to new technology

by learning practical weatherization techniques, exploring innovative energy solutions, discovering career paths in the energy field, and learning to provide the best solutions for our clients.

Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)

Energy Program — Since the major recession in 1975 Congress established many programs including the Emergency Energy Conservation Program which provided a broad array of energy-related activities. Many were designed to provide relief from the high costs of energy. From temporary relief programs to crisis intervention programs to a targeted lifeline program, and others, the programs that have stayed the course and demonstrated the greatest benefits are the ones you will find described here that are still in operation today.

Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) Sometimes referred to as Fuel Assistance Program (FAP)

Since 1980, thanks to funding from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, New Hampshire residents of low-income, including elderly or disabled, are provided financial assistance needed to pay for vital heating and utility expenses through the colder months. LIHEAP also offers case management to develop a plan to achieve increased financial self-sufficiency to avoid energy-related emergencies such as running out of heating fuel.

Neighbor Helping Neighbor

Neighbor Helping Neighbor (NHN) is a non-profit, 501(c)(3) charitable corporation created in 1986 to help utility customers who experience some sort of emergency or financial hardship but are unable to qualify for other government-funded energy assistance programs such as LIHEAP. The board of directors is made up of representatives from the participating utilities and the five (5) Community Action Partnerships (CAPs) across the state.

NHN provides utility assistance to prevent customers of participating utilities from having their utility service disconnected.

Fuel households served: 10,681 Total fuel benefit value: \$10,214,122 Average benefit per household: \$956.29 The LIHEAP program, also known as the Fuel Assistance Program, continues to help eligible participants with heating costs using funds from the Department of Energy distributed by local Community Action Programs. Benefits depend on household size, income, and heating fuel type. In emergencies, the program arranges fuel delivery or provides referrals for additional aid. The Electric Assistance Program (EAP) offers monthly



discounts on electric bills for eligible customers of certain utilities, including renters, subsidized renters, and homeowners.

As Community Action Programs were created as part of the "War on Poverty," we know that a successful career is the single best direct roadmap for economic independence for those we serve. To that end, since 1974 we have operated many different programs designed to help train, educate, and provide the support to help our clients overcome barriers to successful and meaningful employment.

Early programs included **Neighborhood Youth Corps** that provided high school age youth from families of low-income work during the summer; and the **Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA)**, a training program the included classroom instruction and on-the-job-training.

In 2000 we were selected to serve as a major partner in the delivery of the NH Employment Program (NHEP). This became the primary welfare reform effort designed to promote economic independence. Partners in this effort included the NH Department of Health and Human Services and the NH Department of Employment Security to form interagency teams. These teams were located at thirteen (13) locations throughout the state.

From 2004 until 2010 we operated the **Families** @ **Work** (**F**@**W**) program, which was funded by the State of NH Department of Health and Human Services. F@W worked with families who were exiting the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) benefit program due to employment to ensure that they retained employment and did not return to TANF.

In 1998 the **Workforce Investment Act (WIA)** was enacted. At that time, we contracted with the NH Department of Resources and Economic Development to provide those services. In 2014 WIA was replaced by the **Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)**. We continue to contract with the State through the NH Department of Business & Economic Affairs, Office of Workforce Opportunity, to be the statewide operator of the Department of Labor (DOL) WIOA Adult program.

Workforce

English for New Americans (ENA) started at the Latin American Center as English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) classes in 1997. Over the years different locations and funding sources allowed this work to continue. Currently, we contract with the NH Department of Education, NH Adult Education to serve as the operator of the English for New Americans (ENA) program in Manchester. ENA provides ESOL classes for refugees, immigrants, and visitors from many other countries to come together to practice reading, writing, listening, and speaking the English language. Classes offer practical English for living and working in the community as well as conversing with friends and neighbors.

Workforce

The Workforce Innovation and
Opportunity Act (WIOA) Adult program
provides eligible adults with professional
career counseling and access to a wide
range of employment and trainingrelated services. This includes tuition
assistance and support services that can

help eliminate various barriers to employment. This

helps participants increase their earning potential and helps NH employers meet their workforce needs. Those receiving public assistance, those of low income, those who are basic skills deficient, veterans, and eligible spouses of veterans are a priority of service.

We are a proud member of the NH Works system, an American Job Center Network. This partnership includes the NH Department of Business & Economic Affairs, NH Department of Education, NH Employment Security, NH Department of Health & Human Services, Senior Community Services Employment Program, and the Community College System of New Hampshire.

ENA provides ESOL classes for refugees, immigrants, and visitors from many other countries to come together to practice reading, writing, listening, and speaking the English language. Classes offer practical English for living and working in the community as well as conversing with friends and neighbors. Each class addresses the needs of each student's levels of English proficiency from beginner to advanced and also offers advancement in basic computer skills for enrolled students. Citizenship classes are offered and open to anyone needing help preparing to take the exam to become a naturalized American citizen.

Each class meets twice a week on alternate days with morning and evening options available to fit student schedules. Classes and registration are open year-round. In 2024 the previously mentioned New Hampshire Employment Program (NHEP) had its most significant change. The new program, named the **Strengthening Citizens and Businesses for Economic Mobility (referred to as Career Advancement Services)** shares the same outcome goals as the prior grant, but the approach was changed. In addition, it was no longer operated with a single provider statewide, instead, five (5) distinct regions were created.


We have been contracted by the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Economic Stability, to serve as the operator of three (3) of those regions: Concord/Laconia, Rochester/Seacoast, and Berlin/Conway/Littleton. The program much like

the former NHEP program, continues to provide workforce development services focused on assisting current, transitioning, and former NHEP/TANF participants in obtaining career advancement support services and opportunities that will assist them in achieving continued upward economic mobility.

Your Money In "Action"

Understanding financial literacy and budgeting is a central tool for families who are taking steps toward becoming financially independent. We have always provided services to those we serve to help them better understand budgeting. Like many programs, the names and funders change but the goal remains the same. Individuals of our current program, Your Money in Action (YMIA), are empowered to take charge of their financial situation and move forward with the skills to maintain a better financial balance.

We work with each participant through a holistic coaching strategy starting with an assessment of the family's needs, goal setting, and support from our other programs and community partners as needed. This three-part course provides assignments to help reflect on the information they receive in the course and begin to apply the principles to their own lives: financial goal setting, budgeting,

Head Start

We opened the first Head Start program in 1965 at White Wing School in Nashua which was housed at the Unitarian Universalist Church on Lowell Street. Forty-five (45) children were enrolled in the first program.

A few years later Manchester Community Action became part of our agency, and we were renamed Southern NH Services, Inc.

Over the next two decades, Head Start expanded throughout Hillsborough County and we began to provide what was called "wrap around" Head Start. This meant we added child care services so that children could

have full day care. In 2011 Rockingham Community Action became part of our agency and

their programs including Head Start became our responsibility.

<u>Head Start</u> provides comprehensive child development services that foster children's growth in social, emotional, cognitive, and development, and monitor their progress in these areas to ensure that they are well-prepared for kindergarten.

Early Head Start Early Head Start programs provide family-centered services for families of low-income with very young children. These programs are designed to promote the development of the children and to enable their parents to fulfill their roles as parents and to move toward self-sufficiency.

<u>Full Day Child Care</u> For parents in need of child care during the work week, we offer full-day and extended-day child care for infants, toddlers, and preschool children. These programs provide nutritious breakfasts, lunches, and snacks while also working with families to address the special health and nutritional needs of each child.

We are pleased to provide classrooms at local schools and colleges including: Manchester Community College (MCC), West High School, and Nashua Community College (NCC) providing the same quality of care and education while providing hands on experience to high school and college students persuing child development careers.
